The Trans-Pacific Partnership: Better Protections for Human Rights Needed

Thank you for inviting me to present my views. On behalf of Human Rights Watch, we're grateful for the opportunity to outline our concerns with the Trans-Pacific Partnership.

At the outset, I want to make clear that, in the abstract, Human Rights Watch takes no position for or against free trade and economic agreements.

The Trans-Pacific Partnership agreement, however, raise several important human rights concerns—specifically, with respect to labor rights, intellectual property, the right to health, and free expression and privacy rights on the internet. I am providing committee members with a <u>Q &A recently published by Human Rights Watch</u> outlining these issues. We believe that policymakers ought to consider these concerns as they consider supporting or opposing the TPP, and as they craft legislation to address the agreement.
